

- designing a high school research course and equipping high schools with STEM research labs (as on the coasts),
- hiring a full-time grant writer, and
- reviewing best practices across the country in performance-based compensation.

As a board member of District 204, I will hold the district accountable for maintaining high educational standards WITHIN THE BUDGET, WITHOUT RAISING TAXES! Also, we can no longer rely on Springfield or Washington for bailouts. The District is going to have to continue to dig hard and deep, identify "necessities vs. wants", eliminate the practice of paying un-itemized bills, and living within our means. I will ask every employee to submit to their department heads three ways to cut cost without negatively affecting the quality of education and/or safety of our students and employees. The resulting ideas should be consolidated and prioritized according to costs, feasibility, and time constraints and continued through the administrative hierarchy. In addition, it is important to represent ALL taxpayers in a timely manner. This is achieved by remembering the school board works for the public and NOT the other way around and agenda items should be driven by the NEEDS of the public versus accommodating the board's schedules. To enhance transparency I will advocate for the district's checkbook register be posted online and in an effort to re-connect with the community by re-instating citizens' committees. In the event that "surpluses" occur, as was reported during the first BOE meeting of the year, I will advocate rebates for every household in the district.

Becoming a school board member is an opportunity to best represent and be an advocate for all 29,500 children and parents in Indian Prairie School District. I feel strongly that I can make the best educational and financial decisions on behalf of all parents and taxpayers living in the District without sacrificing the quality teachers and education we have come to expect in this community. I will make it my mission to stay informed about educational and financial issues here at home and at the State and Federal levels. It will be my job to represent everyone in the District equally and fairly, and I

priorities and ensure that D204 continues to deliver results. This accountability system is comprised of our mission, guiding principles, goals and specific targets and measurements. My goals are fully aligned with the six goals the board has set for our district:

- 1. Increase the percent of students exceeding state learning standards
- 2. Increase our average ACT score
- Narrow the achievement gap experienced by key student sub-groups
- 4. Ensure proficiency in 21st century skills
- 5. Manage our resources efficiently and effectively
- 6. Be student and community focused

By being both accessible to the community and solution-oriented, I have a record of passing policy changes that better the lives of our students. One of the most recent policy changes I championed originated from a parent discovering their child's bus stop was on the front stoop of a registered sex offender. District policy now requires bus stops to be a minimum of 500 ft from the residence of registered sex offenders (and our website now provides a user-friendly link to registered sex offender databases).

What steps will you take towards creating open dialogue and transparency with the community?

In just the last couple of years we have made significant improvements in communication and transparency by: hiring a superintendent who is a gifted communicator, reinstating our annual report to the community, introducing the Connect-Ed phone message system, placing board materials on-line in advance of the meetings, holding press conferences to coincide with significant events, and launching 204TV.org (an on-demand video channel where you can watch board meetings and presentations related to academics and finances).

In addition, I have personally spent time in all of the district's 33 schools and many community organizations listening to parents and taxpayers. I'm driven by the belief that our families and taxpayers are the true owners of the district and will continue to seek new ways to improve upon our existing communication and transparency efforts.

- **1a**. I have been married for 19 years to David and we have two children in the district. Colin is a 7^{th} grader at Still Middle School and Katie is a 5^{th} grader at Owen Elementary.
- **1b.** I graduated from Eastern Illinois University in 1987 with a B.S. in Consumer Affairs.
- 1c. I am in my fourth and final year as President of the Indian Prairie Special Needs (IPSN) PTA and have also been a member of Indian Prairie Parents' Council (IPPC) for four years. I'm active in both Owen and Still PTAs and currently serve as their Legislative Chairperson. Prior to my commitments in PTA, I was also a Girl Scout leader for two years. I am a member of District 204's Special Olympics Advisory Board and am serving my second year on State Rep. Darlene Senger's Educational Advisory Committee. I advocated for the restoration of cuts made to education by organizing "Caravan to the Capitol" last April in which I took two busloads of parents with me to Springfield to talk with state legislators.
- 2. Why do you want to serve on the District 204 Board of Education? Having been on multiple PTA boards, several district committees, as well an educational advisory committee, I've had the opportunity to work with parents and teachers from across the district, as well as administrators and state legislators. I bring knowledge of the issues and their impact to students, teachers and taxpayers. Serving in this district has also been one of the most gratifying and rewarding things I've ever done. I welcome the opportunity to take my commitment to this district to the next level and to be engaged in the decisions that affect this community. I come to the table with no agenda, but with a true desire to preserve and improve upon the educational excellence that will enable all of our students to reach their greatest potential, mindful of how the board's decisions affect the taxpayers.
- 3. Given the current composition of the school board, what role do you see yourself taking or continuing, given your experience, personality, and skill set? One of the key roles of a school board member is to serve as the leading advocate on behalf of students. I have been an advocate for my own children for 13 years and an advocate for special needs families in this district for the last 4 years. Through my experience in these roles, I have found a passion for advocacy in education that I feel would be beneficial to students, parents and teachers as a member of the Board of Education. I have two children in this district: a son with special needs and a typically developing daughter. I feel I bring both perspectives to the table and can advocate for all parents and students. In addition to being an advocate, another key role of a school board member is to represent the district as a whole. In my role as president of a district-wide PTA, I am engaged with parents and teachers from every part of the district, including administration. I feel I have a

- good understanding of how each of these groups needs to work together to insure the success of all of our students.
- 4. What specific changes to district goals and/or policy will you advocate for and why? I would advocate for added emphasis on social/emotional learning. Social success plays an important role in academic success. With so much of society stressing the importance of the prevention of bullying, we need to educate our students on the effects of bullying and give our students the support they need to cope with or counter what are often daily attacks on individuals because of differences; either physical or cognitive, cultural or socio-economical. I would also advocate creating more partnerships within our community. We have an amazing network of individuals (with and without children in this district) and business partners who we can invite to be a part of the ongoing efforts to challenge our children and help them become more engaged learners. By inviting these people to be involved in these efforts, we foster a sense of community for the entire district, not just in our own backyards.
- 5. What steps will you take towards creating open dialogue and transparency with the community? I think much has already been done in this area. Every week there are various communications sent out from the district such as Points of Pride, Around the District, eNews, ConnectEd, and the Superintendent's message. Communication is also going out not only to District 204 parents, but to the entire community through a quarterly newsletter so those in the district without schoolaged children can be kept informed of how our tax dollars are being spent and to see the accomplishments of the school district in which they reside. It also allows those members of our district to feel a connection to the community through the schools. In addition, board meetings are now available on 2040nDemand. Through BoardDocs, the public can see what is on the agenda in a very specific format, including the presentations made to the board. In these ways, the district is demonstrating how we are educating our students at the level our community expects and within the financial constraints that our community understands to be reasonable. These efforts need to continue if we are to bring unity to our district again.
